

Basic Boating Class Scheduled

The squadron education department has scheduled a basic boating class for April in the meeting room at the Cabela's Christiana Mall store. This will be our fourth class there. It is an excellent facility in a great location and we are very happy to be back. P/C Dave Sharpless, AP will be the principal instructor.

The class will begin on Tuesday, 10 April at 6:30 and continue for two hours. Sessions will continue for the next three Tuesday evenings, wrapping up on 1 May with the 60 question exam. Efforts are underway to promote the class through Craig's list, the Cabela's events calendar, the Delaware Boating Education Office's on-line calendar and posters at marine related stores and whatever publications we can reach. Your help in suggesting other locations to post this class would be appreciated. Safe boater certification is required on Delaware waters for anyone operating a mechanically propelled boat who was born after January 1, 1978. On Maryland waters, certification is required for persons born after January 1, 1972.

When the states first began requiring certification the apparent target was young adults on jet skis. But as time marched on, the target group is not so young anymore. You may know some "forty-somethings" who need certificates. Let them know and tell them to give me a call at (302) 368-7857 for information and to reserve a seat.

Spring Will Get Here; Perhaps Sooner Than We Think

As an indicator that there will be a spring, Chris and I have been getting things together for our next boating season. I am sure that some of you are doing the same thing. We actually started making a list of things that needed to be fixed or upgraded as we decommissioned the boat in the fall, but now it's time to start planning those projects and collecting materials and shopping for upgrades. Like the typical power squadron class topics, boat maintenance is a bottomless pit of essential knowledge. Much of it is specialized to each boat and is found through independent study of publications, manuals and on-line. But our friends, colleagues and professionals are invaluable resources. Whether it is the rules, handling, navigating, and yes, maintaining or repairing, education remains at the heart of an enjoyable, safe and satisfying lifestyle.

First on the list was to deal with the inoperative trim tabs. Our very knowledgeable and helpful marina owner George Ritter tested the system and said there was power up to the hydraulic control unit (HCU) and there was probably a fault in the solenoids that control the fluid to and from the tab actuators. He suggested we should send the HCU to Bennett and have them check out and provide the repair parts. He is always confident we can do a job and tells us to call manufacturers and suppliers for technical advice. After looking at Bennett's trouble shooting videos we thought it would be easier and not a lot more expensive to replace the HCU and ordered it. On a mild day in January we took a ride to the boat to check our winter cover and the overall state of storage and install the control unit. It's good to visit the boat occasionally through the winter to check on things and remind ourselves of good times. It was easy to install the unit. But it didn't work. Chris went back to the videos which suggested other problems beyond the HCU and some wire jiggling, and the trim tabs worked! We'll keep an eye on them and continue to check the wiring and connections before we splash.

Spring Will Get Here; Perhaps Sooner Than We Think;

We made a note to bring some no-corrode spray for the connections. In fact it would be good to spray all connections. Maybe we can also get the automatic control system to work—kind of like cruise control for the boat's trim. we'll need to do some more study and watch more videos to troubleshoot that system.

We also wanted to replace our VHF radio this year. The old one worked, but we could never understand a word that was received. I don't think it is supposed to be that way. Chris found a good price for a Standard Horizon radio that features noise cancelling audio output, but also has AIS (Automatic Identification System) and integral GPS. It was far more than I would have considered, but not really expensive. How could I say no? AIS is radio broadcast and GPS plotted information about vessels' positions, courses and speeds as well as their identity. It is mandatory on large commercial vessels and becoming popular among recreational boaters. Any system that can give me information about nearby traffic would be a good thing. This radio will only receive that information, but that is enough for us. I'll do what I need to stay out of the way. I'll have to study the unit and its manual to figure out how it works. USPS has also developed a seminar about AIS which BOAT US offers on-line. I should do that. This VHF radio also has an integrated GPS so that there will be no extra connections to activate the DSC (Digital Selective Calling) distress signal. I am one of the nearly 90% of boaters who hasn't bothered to connect their radios to their GPS units and benefit from the automatic distress system.

We also bought the hailer/fog signal horn so that we can communicate from the foredeck to the helm when anchoring. It works both ways. If we're underway or anchored out in fog, this unit can generate the appropriate sounds automatically and listen for other signals. This is a very sophisticated system and I'll need some time to study the manual.

During last year's trips, we incurred some serious scrapes in the gelcoat. Chris is our epoxy expert and has gathered some pointers on gelcoat repair. But she will be looking deeper for information on how to do it right with the least work and the best results. She will certainly be talking to George, an expert perfectionist at all things FRP (fiberglass reinforced plastic).

I see the diesel mechanic who rebuilt our engine around our boatyard from time to time. He is working independently now and also very generous with his advice. I hired him last season to adjust the valve lash. Adjustment was due after the engine was rebuilt five years ago.

He suggested that I take out the turbocharger aftercooler for inspection and cleaning before this season because the exchanger is prone to cracking and leaking water into the engine which can lead to catastrophic failure.

On another mild day we visited the boat and we started to remove the cooler cover. There are some tricky attachment points, and like most Caterpillar parts extraordinarily heavy. After a time examining the installation and studying the engine manuals, I've decided to call the mechanic. He'd know where to take the heat exchanger for cleaning and I'd want him to examine it anyway.

I think that even with a start in January, there will be just enough time to get things ready.

Spring is sooner than you think.


Boating Safety News

Power Cords and Fires

Shore power cords and faulty receptacles are suspected of causing the majority of marina fires.




A power connection may have potential exceeding 10,000 watts. When that power meets resistance heat results and fires may start. For example, my heat gun is rated 1200 watts.



Resistance could be in the form of corrosion on the blades of the plug because the end of the line was dropped overboard. Or perhaps, the line was repeatedly plugged into, or unplugged from, the pedestal without first turning it off. This can

line was repeatedly plugged into, or unplugged from, the pedestal without first turning it off. This can cause pitting of the surface of the plug into which dirt may accumulate causing resistance.

If there is a locking ring attached to the cord be sure to use it to support the cord to the pedestal. If not, wrap it around the pedestal or lash it in place, it should be well supported. Check the condition of your power cord routinely, clean the contacts and apply corrosion inhibitor to them and you will help reduce electrical problems and fires.

In Memoriam

We have just recently learned of the passing of **P/C Pierce (Dick) W. Johnston Jr., AP**, in October of 2016. Dick served as our Commander from 1980-1981 and was a **58** year member of WPS with 33 merit marks. He was an avid boater during his earlier squadron years. Age, health, and mobility issues compelled Dick, long regarded as an expert on WPS history, to research and formally chronicle our fascinating past (people and activities). Preceding Dick in death, wife Sara Jane was also a long-term squadron contributor and Certificate Holder.

P/C Robert F. Mahaney (Bob), AP, passed quietly on January 16, 2018 at his residence, the Regal Heights Nursing Home in Hockessin. Bob's love of the boating hobby led him to a long-term association with WPS that began over 50 years ago. A perennial member of the Executive Committee, Bob had two terms as Squadron Commander, was a WPS multi-year Treasurer, served as Budget Chair of District 5 for one year, and established a WPS data base during his long-enduring term as our IT (MIS) Chair. The format and annual upgrading of both the Squadron Yearbook and Cruise Book were products of his abilities. Further, countless operating committees throughout the years were beneficiaries of his participation. This commitment of time and expertise earned him 39 Merit Marks.

Bob's commitment to USPS extended beyond Wilmington borders. He attended most District 5 and National General Membership meetings as our representative throughout his active years. Declining health forced him into inactivity. He was fluent in all facets of USPS. Bob was yet another of those members whose efforts helped to make WPS not only what it was, but what WSPS is today.

Services were held on Saturday, January 27, at the Mealey Funeral Home, 2509 Limestone Road, Wilmington at 11:00 AM. Interment was at All Saints Cemetery.
